The information will be stored safely and securely on your phone.
The Parent Portal will be accessed by parents and carers of up to 80,000 new babies in Victoria each year.
Parents or carers can create a profile for their children, including key health and development information such as a growth tracker, digital birth certificate and birth registration.
The physical green book will still be available if you want it, and used alongside the digital version.
Additional features will be added to the online portal over time.
To access the Parent Portal, go to service.vic.gov.au or the Service Victoria app.

State-led support to thrive

Children aged eight and under – with low to moderate developmental delay or autism – deserve support to thrive.
That's why Thriving Kids launches in Victoria from October this year.
Thriving Kids will bring together Victoria's Maternal Child Health system and early childhood education system with new state-led support for children from birth to eight.
Two new development assessments will be available for every child: one before kinder, and one before school.
Trained clinicians and allied health professionals will identify development delays and connect families with support.
Allied health professionals and support workers will be employed by the Government and based in services families already use.
These include maternal child health, kindergartens and early parenting centres.
With Thriving Kids, children can build on their strengths, gain independence and develop skills they need for life.
Children with permanent and significant disability or high support needs will continue to access the NDIS.
Jess Wilson's Liberals want to hand out a voucher and tell families to find their own private specialist when their children start Prep.

Kealy urges country motorists to have their say



THE Nationals’ Member for Lowan, Emma Kealy, is calling on residents across the Wimmera and south-west Victoria to flood the RACV with feedback on the area’s worst roads.

The RACV has launched its annual My Country Road survey to ask Victorians for their thoughts on the most dangerous country highways identified by RACV, or to nominate a regional road they believe urgently needs safety improvements. The Western, Henty, Pyrenees and Glenelg highways are among those the RACV has identified.

Ms Kealy said more than half of serious road crashes in Victoria happened on regional roads, and many on highways identified by the RACV as high-risk due to their design and crash history, including the Western Highway. Of the 114 people killed on Victorian roads so far this year, 68 of these deaths occurred in regional areas.

“Our roads and highways are our lifeblood, but they are disintegrating because of lack of funding and maintenance,” Ms Kealy said.

“Major thoroughfares like the Western Highway are falling to bits. This is the main route from Melbourne to Adelaide and yet it is riddled with potholes, shoulders are crumbling, and the promised duplication has been stalled since 2019.

“The fact the RACV is even running this survey shows we have a major problem. “Labor talks about ‘rebuilding and repairing’, but our roads are worse than ever.

“Our communities are paying the price for a Labor government that has got its priorities all wrong.

“Only the Nationals will work with rural and regional communities to deliver the investments in roads that our communities need and deserve.”

Ms Kealy encouraged people to visit racv.com.au/haveyoursay to log their concerns. The survey closes on 17 July 2026.

IN the 1890s, Nhill kids adopted a brand-new game — one they'd never seen, never heard, and certainly never been taught. It was **Cowboys & Indians**.

It was sparked by a Wild West Show rolling into town.

On 29 December 1890, the “Wild West” came to what many already called the “Wild West of Victoria”. Not because of gunfights, but because Nhill’s raw timber and iron buildings looked uncannily like the frontier towns of America.

The show was part of a double attraction staged by Wirth Brothers, who also brought a massive circus — the largest spread of canvas ever seen in Australia. The whole spectacle arrived by train from Adelaide and began with a parade along Nelson and Victoria Streets: covered wagons, a stagecoach, horses, cattle, an American bison, real cowboys, and Native Americans direct from the United States. Advertising claimed that “all the greatest Tribes” were represented.

While the Wild West Show — billed as a Grand Open-Air Carnival — played out in the afternoon at the showgrounds, roustabouts were busy erecting a huge four-pole, two-ring big top in the railway yards opposite the Royal Hotel.

Advance Agent James Hugo, who plastered bills across Nhill and organised the Free Press advertising, wasn’t entirely sure where the circus would fit, so the posters simply promised it would appear “Somewhere in the centre of

the Town.”

Nhill was barely ten years old, with a population just over a thousand, yet the night-time circus drew 1,400 people from the district — a crowd larger than the town itself.

The outdoor game of Cowboys & Indians flourished from the late 19th century into the mid-20th, fuelled first by Wild West shows such as the above, and later by Hollywood films.

The game boomed, especially when cap guns, toy rifles, and feathered headdresses became widely available.

The “golden age” of westerns offered a simple world of “goodies vs baddies”, perfect for backyard re-enactments.

Popularity faded when kids shifted to “war” games or “cops and robbers”, and cultural attitudes toward Indigenous representation changed.

But in Nhill, the origin story was always local: a single day in 1890 when a frontier fantasy marched down the main street and every kid in town decided to keep the show going.

Footnote: The First Circus in Nhill

Wirths may have been the most famous circus to arrive by train, but it wasn’t the first. In 1883, when Nhill was only three years old, St Leon’s Circus staged the town’s inaugural spectacle. Residents — only a few hundred at the time — watched a parade of men, women, horses, and a menagerie of wild animals, led by a band wagon.



For a young settlement battling isolation and monotony, it was no doubt a moment of wonder.

to keep the district’s clocks, fob watches, and wedding rings in working order.

For 80 years the shop was synonymous with the Smith family—two generations who polished, repaired, and engraved. But the story of this small building stretches further back, through a succession of earlier jewellers and watchmakers who each left their mark long before the Smiths made it their own.

What stands today as part of a quirky café that was once one of Nhill’s most meticulous workplaces: a place where time was literally taken apart and put back together.

Nhill managed to host not one, but two jewellers named Smith in different eras, leaving me to untangle which Smith

was polishing which watch because they were not related. The first Smith was Peter Cockburn Smith, P.C. Smith, who was an American-born watchmaker and jeweller from Charleston, South Carolina. He immigrated to Victoria in 1857. After operating businesses in Stawell and Ararat alongside his father, he relocated to the one-year-old Nhill and opened a shop in Victoria Street in 1881. The second and unrelated Smith was John Robieson Smith

(Jack) who was born in Scotland and came to Nhill to manage Walter McNee's Jewellers in Victoria Street, the shop with "Watchmaker" stamped in concrete on the façade.

McNee had taken over the shop in 1911 from William Brooks, the first jeweller-watchmaker to operate at that Victoria Street address after shifting his business from Macpherson Street in 1906.

In 1914, “Jock” Smith purchased the business from McNee and began trading under the name J.R. Smith, later J.R. Smith & Son. Over the next decades he built a reputation for precision, reliability, and a shopfront that always had something worth stopping to look at.

During the First World War and throughout the 1920s, Smith regularly travelled to neighbouring towns — Kaniva among them — where he set up temporary window and counter displays in local hotels. His Nhill windows were equally well known: patriotic exhibits, casualty lists, and wartime memorabilia drew crowds, and in 1956 his displays featured specialised Omega timing instruments to mark the Melbourne Olympic Games.

Jock's son, John David Smith, apprenticed under his father and continued the long-standing pairing of watchmaking and jewellery — a practical combination, given the shared tools and the shared patience required. After Jock's death in 1959,

John carried on the business until 1994.

Away from the bench, John was a multi-instrumentalist and Bandmaster of the Nhill Brass Band for 29 years. He was often called upon to play the Last Post at memorial services and gravesides.

After his retirement he remembered the Victoria Street shop as relentlessly busy — often three weeks behind. Watches were the greatest challenge: with around 3,000 different types on the market, parts often had to be sourced from Melbourne, and in a typical year he repaired up to 1,500 watches and clocks. On one occasion he threw two troublesome clocks into the Nhill depot rubbish heap, only for a local to bring them back asking whether they could be fixed.

Engagement rings were not a strong seller — couples were too embarrassed to shop locally — but wedding rings sold steadily.

When asked to sum up a lifetime in the jeweller's shop, John Smith offered a characteristically understated verdict:

“Not too bad at all.”

John died in Nhill in 1999 aged 70

The Watchmaker shop became a florist shop in 1994 “Classic Blooms by Suz”.

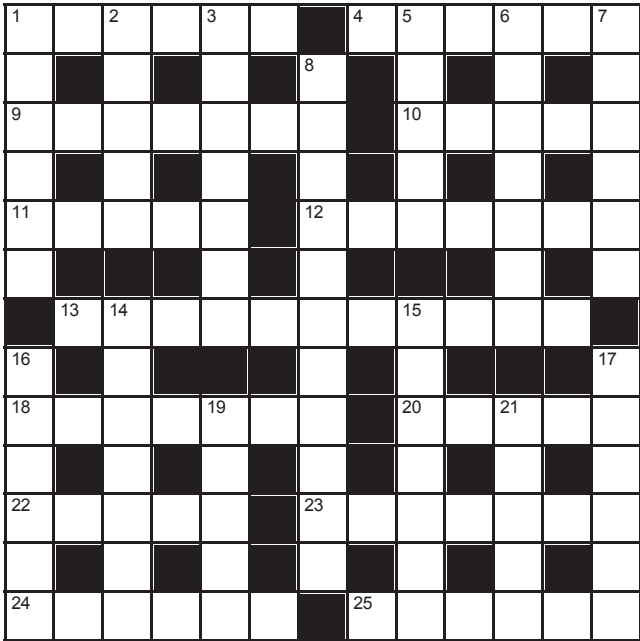

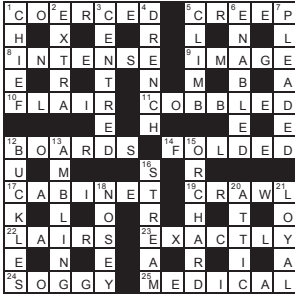

Cancer experts urge men to open up about their health

THIS Men’s Health Week, Cancer Council Victoria is urging men to take steps to reduce their risk of cancer, with latest data from the Victorian Cancer Registry showing men are more than 20 per cent more likely to be diagnosed with cancer than women.

The Victorian Cancer Registry also found that for every 100 women diagnosed with cancer, 122 men will be diagnosed, with men’s cancer risk increasing further with age. By the age of 75, one in three men will develop cancer compared to one in four women.

The five most common cancers in men are prostate, bowel, melanoma, lung and head and neck, accounting for 56 per cent of all new cancer diagnoses in men.

It is estimated that 3500 fewer men were diagnosed with cancer between 2020 and the end of 2023 than predicted, meaning men may have missed important health checks and could be at risk of later stage diagnosis.

With the COVID-19 pandemic’s impact on cancer diagnoses, Cancer Council Victoria’s CEO Todd Harper AM said it was important for men to get up to date with their cancer screening and see their doctor if they notice unusual changes.

“We want men to open up and talk about their health with friends or family, a colleague or health professional. We hear so many stories about how important these initial conversations are in motivating change or a lifesaving action,” he said.

The good news is that for many of these common cancer types, Australia has free cancer screening programs and resources to support men.

“Many of the most common cancers affecting men, including bowel, melanoma and lung cancer, are linked to preventable risk factors,

but there are practical steps we can take to reduce our risk,” Mr Harper said.

“Keeping up to date with cancer screenings, taking steps to quit smoking or vaping, reducing our alcohol intake, eating a healthy diet and staying physically active can all make a tangible difference. Seeing a doctor if you notice any changes and getting checked early is important too.”

Here are some top tips for men to help reduce their cancer risk:

- Keep up to date with your bowel cancer screening: People aged 45 to 74 should do the free home test kit every two years through the National Bowel Cancer Screening Program.
- Get support to quit smoking or vaping: Visit www.quit.org.au or call Quitline 13 7848.
- Do your lung cancer screening. People aged 50 to 70 with a history of smoking may now be eligible for a free lung scan every 2 years through the National Lung Cancer Screening Program. Visit your GP to see if you’re eligible.
- Be aware of changes: Men of every age should get to know their bodies and see a doctor immediately if they notice any unexpected changes.
- Be SunSmart: When the UV is three or above, remember to use all forms of sun protection. It’s also good to get to know your skin – if you notice any changes in shape, colour or size to spots, visit your GP as soon as possible.

Good News for You Public and Private Grief

Australia’s sport world recently paused for Neale Daniher’s state funeral, to show respect for him and for how his relentless personal fight against motor neuron disease has raised almost \$200 million in the search for a cure.

As thousands of sports figures and fans gathered at the Melbourne Cricket Ground, millions more watched its direct telecast or later news highlights. Family members, players, and colleagues all shared their admiration for his double-pronged attitude to any challenge - to “look for the opportunity” and to “play on.”

Everyone sensed the death threat lurking in his twelve-year fight, but no one could predict when it would come.

By contrast, while that major public event took place, I led a private graveside service for a family who could never have anticipated the fatal collision that had suddenly thrust grief into their midst.

However, grief combines public and private elements.

Public grief revolves around people’s achievements, their reputations, or their legacies; which are major aspects of funerals.

Private grief affects those of us who are closer to those who have passed, and it relates more to who they have been than to their wider influence. Not to belittle that wider influence, but it keeps us from making them greater in

death than they have been in life. This grief recalls their personal foibles or choices; their hobbies or skills; sports loyalty; favorite music; habits or quirky sayings; or what has irked them or even made them a little disagreeable. In short, their uniqueness as individuals and what we have given to them and gained from them.

Public grief may predictably return when anniversaries arrive, or through special memorials to honor those we lose. But private grief can recur without warning, when minor items or events suddenly gain extra significance. This is when we may find God’s comfort; from deep within or through people who take time to be with us in our tears, our smiles, or our silence. Their empathy backs God’s promise to guide us “through the valley of the shadow of death,” as the bible describes it, and it helps our healing to come.

This healing doesn’t wipe grief away, but it reaffirms our own sense of value and how others value us. It also increases our empathy for others, so we begin to see how we may also be agents of God’s comfort and care for them in their grief and pain.

BOOK FAIR FUNDS NEW HERITAGE WALK PLAQUES



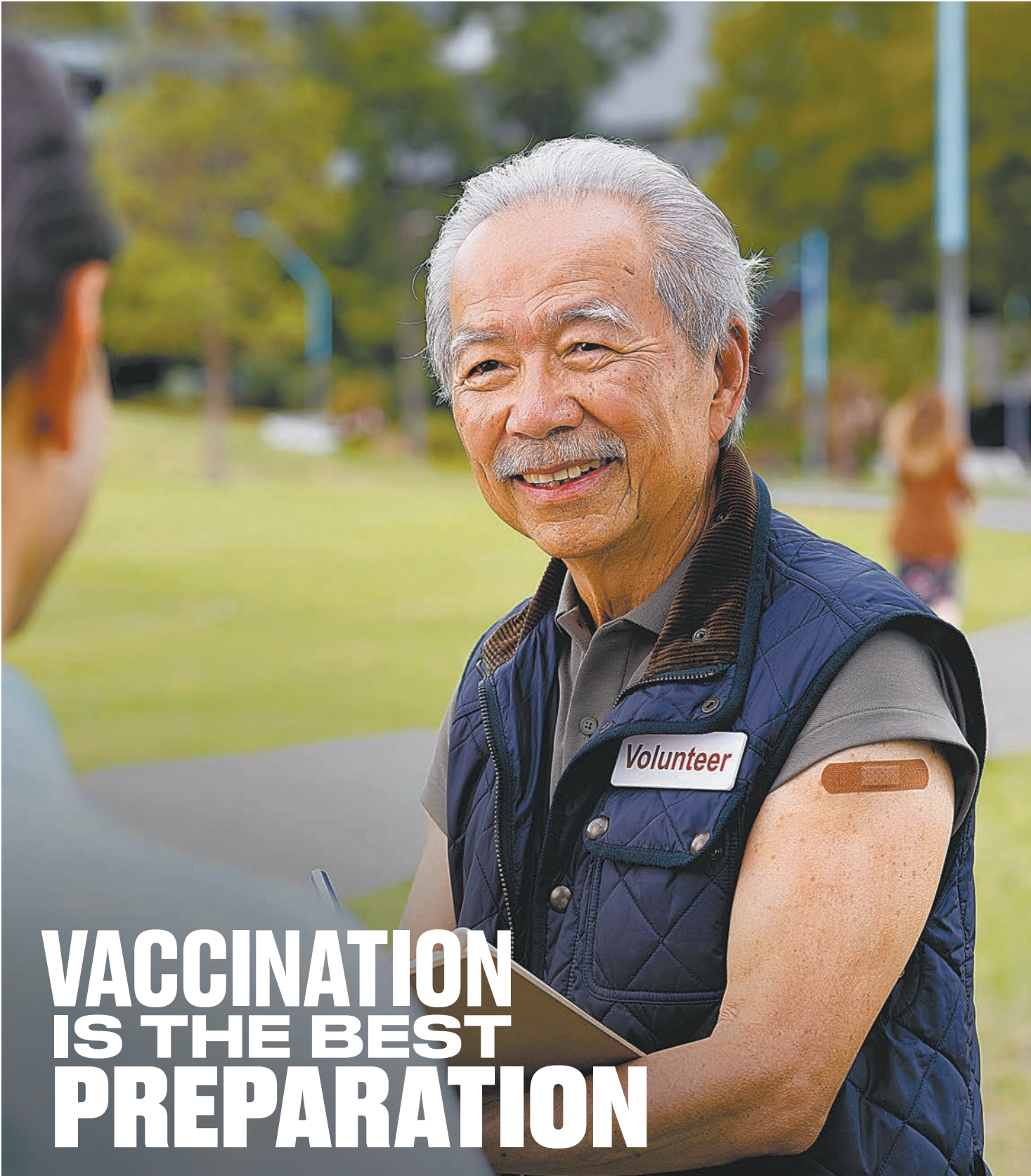
THANKS to profits from Nhill’s Book Fair, the Nhill Aviation Heritage Centre has replaced 40 plaques along the Heritage Walk at the aerodrome.

The plaques feature photos and descriptions of buildings from Nhill’s Second World War RAAF Base. Built in 1941 as part of the Empire Air Training Scheme, the base accommodated up to 1,000 personnel at a time. More than 10,000 servicemen and women are estimated to have passed through the Air School during its five years of operation before it was decommissioned and the buildings sold in 1946. The only remaining buildings from that era are the Bellman Hangar, now leased by the Nhill Aero Club, the Aero Club rooms and the Flight Office. After a two-day clearing sale, only the concrete bases remain from the transportable buildings brought from Ballarat. Many of those buildings can now be seen on farms and in towns across the district.

You can follow the 1.4-kilometre Heritage Walk at any time. Pick up a guide from the information stand at the NAHC and step into the lives of the young men and women who trained for service as pilots or navigators, along with the dentists, engineers, chaplains, mechanics , radio operators and others who helped run the Training Base .

Thank you to all the Book Lovers who head to the Book Fair every month. The profits are helping keep Nhill’s aviation history alive and giving a boost to our tourism .

New funding for Edenhope and Apsley projects

WEST Wimmera Shire Council has secured funding for two community infrastructure projects that will improve accessibility, safety and community wellbeing.

Council has received funding under round 3 of the State Government’s Tiny Towns Fund for a new shelter at Edenhope’s Lake Wallace and for upgrades at the Apsley Hall.

Chief Executive Officer David Bezuidenhout welcomed the announcement and said the projects would deliver lasting benefits for both communities.

“These projects respond directly to needs identified by our communities and will improve important community assets that are used by residents and visitors throughout the year,” he said.

“The Tiny Towns Fund provides valuable support for smaller communities and helps ensure facilities remain accessible, safe and fit for purpose.”

In Edenhope, funding will support the construction of a shelter at the finish area of the Lake Wallace parkrun and walking trail.

The shelter will include a roof structure, protective wall panels, seating and a water tank.

The project will provide weather protection for volunteers, participants and visitors using the Lake Wallace trail.

Lake Wallace parkrun has become a significant community event since commencing in 2022, attracting local participants and visitors from across the region and beyond.

In Apsley, funding will support essential upgrades to the Apsley Hall.

Works will include the removal of asbestos-containing materials, installation of new toilet cubicles including ambulant facilities, replacement ceiling lining and improvements to accessibility through construction of a new compliant entrance pathway.

The upgrades will improve safety and accessibility while supporting the long-term use of the township’s primary community venue.

Council will now work with project stakeholders to finalise planning and delivery timeframes for both projects.

GOROKE College students returned to Goroce Kindergarten this week to celebrate the completion of an inclusive playground they helped create as preschoolers.

This week, those children, who are now in prep, grade 1 and grade 2, were invited back to see the finished playground.

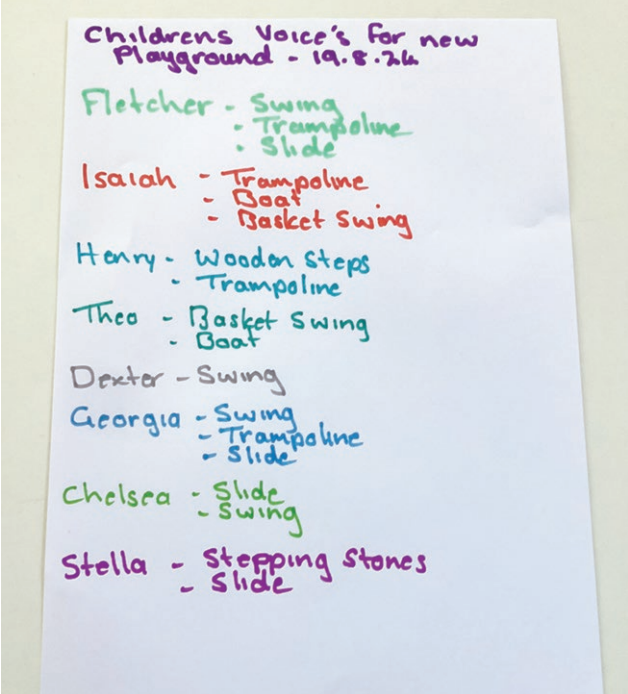
West Wimmera Shire Council Chief Executive Officer David Bezuidenhout said the initiative highlighted the value of student input in community projects.

The visit also provided an opportunity for the former kindergarten students to connect with current children attending the service and share in the celebration of the new playground.

VFF calls for dingos to be removed from the endangered species list in Victoria

THE Victorian Farmers Federation (VFF) is calling on the Victorian Government to immediately remove dingoes from Victoria’s threatened species protections, following the release of new genetic research that raises serious questions about the scientific basis underpinning current conservation policy.

The call follows publication of the 2025 Molecular Ecology paper Domestic Dog Introgression in Australian Dingoes: Environmental Drivers and Evolutionary Consequences, alongside recent research undertaken by the University of Adelaide, which identified substantial levels of domestic dog ancestry within south- eastern Australian dingo populations.

The VFF said the findings fundamentally challenge the rationale for maintaining strict endangered species-style protections for dingo populations in North West Victoria.

VFF Acting President Peter Star said the government could no longer ignore emerging science while livestock producers continued to suffer the consequences of failed policy settings.

“The science underpinning current government policy has shifted.”

“When populations contain significant levels of historic domestic dog hybridisation, the government must seriously reconsider whether these animals should continue to receive the same threatened species protections.”

The research found dingo populations in eastern and southern Australia, including regions directly relevant to Victoria contained up to approximately 20–23 per cent domestic dog ancestry, while more remote central Australian populations remained far more genetically isolated.

Researchers also concluded that previous estimates of hybridisation may have been overstated due to incorrect interpretation of naturally occurring dingo genetic markers.

Mr Star said the Allan Government could no longer justify maintaining rigid protection arrangements while livestock producers across North West Victoria continue to face escalating stock losses, increasing wild dog activity and growing animal welfare concerns.

“Farmers are paying the price for a policy framework increasingly disconnected from both the science and on-ground realities.”

“Two breeding seasons have now occurred since protections were reinstated, and producers are reporting growing predation pressure with fewer practical tools available to respond.”

The VFF said the current Authority to Control Wildlife (ATCW) permit system is failing farmers and creating unnecessary delays for producers attempting to protect livestock on private property adjoining public land.

The VFF is calling on the Victorian Government to:

- Remove dingoes from Victoria’s threatened species protections;
- Immediately review dingo management policy in North West Victoria;
- Restore practical control rights for landholders;
- Streamline ATCW permit access and approvals; and
- Reinstate a minimum three-kilometre management buffer adjoining public land.

The VFF also called on the Government to publicly release updated population modelling, livestock predation data and monitoring information following the reinstatement of protections.

“This has become a test of whether the Government is willing to listen to science, regional communities and common sense.”

“Conservation policy cannot come at the expense of livestock welfare, farming business viability and the safety of regional communities,” Mr Star said.

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PRODUCTIVITY COMMISSION EXPOSES THE COST OF LABOR’S RENEWABLES RAILROADING

FEDERAL Member for Mallee and Shadow Minister for Regional Health, Dr Anne Webster MP, says the Productivity Commission has confirmed what regional Australians have been warning for years: Labor’s ideological rush to renewables is damaging productivity, driving up power bills, and placing an unfair burden on farming communities.

The Productivity Commission’s June 2026 Productivity Bulletin found that capital investment in Australia’s electricity sector has increased by 126 per cent since 2001-02, yet electricity output has increased by only 14 per cent. Australians are paying more, investing more, and getting less in return.

“The Productivity Commission has effectively confirmed that Australia is pouring billions into the energy system without seeing a commensurate increase in electricity output,” Dr Webster said.

“Regional communities are paying the price for Labor’s renewables-at-any-cost agenda while city-based policymakers lecture farmers about what is supposedly in the national interest.”

The Productivity Commission also acknowledged that the renewable transition is highly capital intensive and requires substantial investment in transmission lines, storage, firming capacity and supporting infrastructure.

However, Dr Webster said the Commission’s analysis remains constrained by the government’s own policy framework.

“The report asks how Australia can meet Labor’s emissions targets more efficiently. It does not ask the more fundamental question: what energy mix would deliver the lowest-cost, most reliable and most productive energy system for Australia?”

“That distinction matters.”

“The Productivity Commission has exposed the productivity problem, but it has done so within a framework that

assumes Labor’s renewable targets are fixed. Australians deserve an energy debate that starts with affordability, reliability and productivity, not ideology.”

Dr Webster said the consequences are particularly severe across Mallee, where prime agricultural land is increasingly being targeted for industrial-scale renewable developments and transmission corridors.

“Farmers are losing productive land, communities are facing growing social division, and families are watching their electricity bills climb while being told the transition is making life cheaper.”

“Labor promised households power bills would fall by \$275. Instead, families have seen electricity costs rise substantially while taxpayers are funding billions in subsidies, transmission projects and renewable infrastructure.”

The Productivity Commission’s findings come as Australia continues to experience weak productivity growth, with Australians working harder while economic output struggles to keep pace.

Dr Webster said overseas experience demonstrates there is another path.

“Countries focused on energy security and productivity are pursuing technology-neutral approaches that utilise a mix of renewables, gas, coal, hydro and nuclear generation according to their circumstances.”

“They are focused on increasing electricity supply, maintaining reliability and lowering costs.”

“Australia should be doing the same.”

“For Mallee, this is about more than energy policy. It is about protecting productive farmland, preserving the right to farm, maintaining regional prosperity and ensuring families and businesses can afford to keep the lights on.”

“Regional Australians should not be expected to sacrifice their land, their productivity and their livelihoods to satisfy a policy framework designed in Canberra.”
